Find the people and objects around the building. Tick them when you find them.

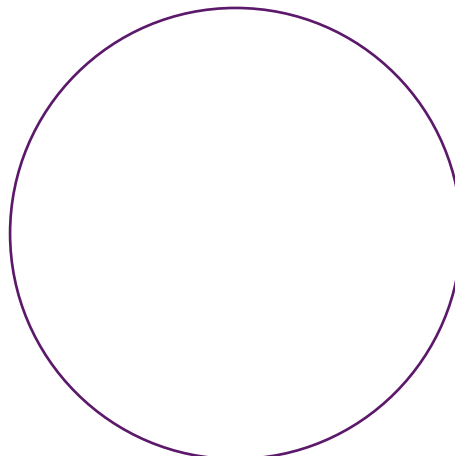

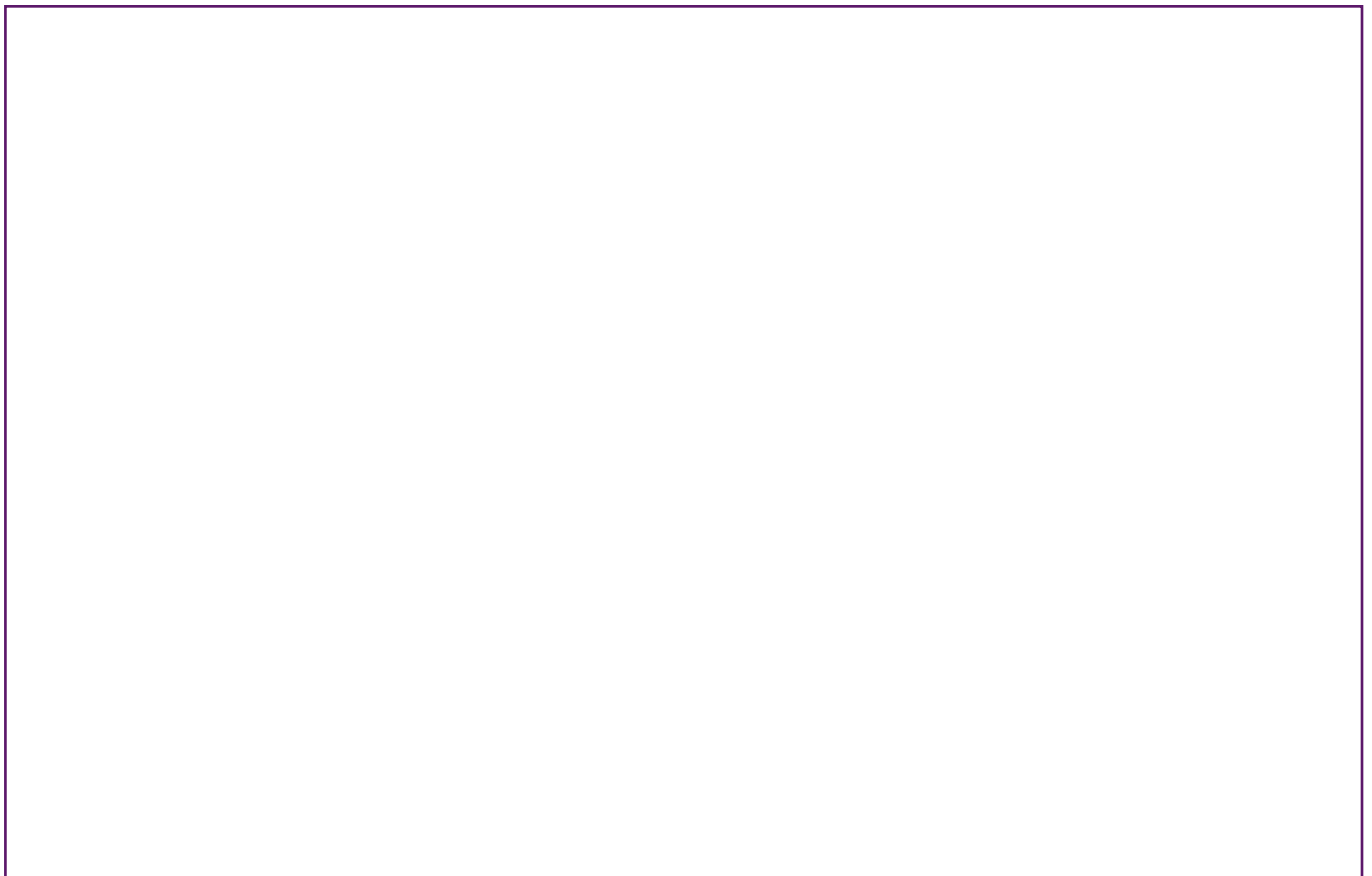

Carefully walk around the Great Bath to find your favourite view and draw what you see in the box.

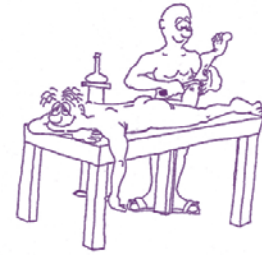


Go into the East Baths and have a good look at the pools, the rooms and the video. Match up the descriptions of how the Romans used to bathe with the cartoons below.

Changing Room (apodyterium)

Here bathers took off their clothes. They picked up their flask of olive oil and strigil.



Bathers had olive oil massaged into their skin. They used a strigil to scrape it off. It removed all the sweat and dirt.



Hot room (caldarium).

This room would be very hot to make you sweat.



Warm room (tepidarium).

Here there were warm pools to sit in.



Cold Room (frigidarium).

Here there were basins and small plunge pools full of cold water. Bathers jumped into the pools.
