



- Take a look at these Bronze Age axes from the collection at the Roman Baths.
- They look very shiny and new, but are actually over 3,000 years old!
- They are made of bronze, which is a mixture of copper and tin. They would have been attached to a wooden handle using natural string.




Make a Bronze Age Axe!

You will need: card, newspaper, masking tape or sticky tape, glue, poster paints and string and sticks (to decorate)

You will also need to make some papier maché paste. There are lots of different recipes for this, we have used the cheapest and quickest which needs

- 1 mug of flour
- 1 mug of water
- 2 tablespoons of salt (to stop mould)
- 1. Draw an axe head onto the card. Look at the photo of our template to help you, or you can draw your own. Cut it out, then draw round it again so you have two heads.



2. Scrunch up some strips of newspaper into small balls. Use glue or sticky tape to stick the balls to one of your axe heads. Glue your other axe head on top, like a sandwich.



- 3. Mix the ingredients of your papier maché together until they form a paste. You may need to add extra flour or water to get the preferred consistency.
- 4. Cover thin strips of newspaper in the paste, and use these to cover the axe head. Be careful not to overlap the strips too much or make too many layers at once or your axe will take a long time to dry!
- 5. Leave the axe to dry. Repeat step 4 until the axe is hard. You might like to make the last layer from white paper, kitchen towel or loo roll so it will be easier to paint.
- 6. Paint the axe using poster paints. You can decorate with string and make a handle from sticks if you like.
